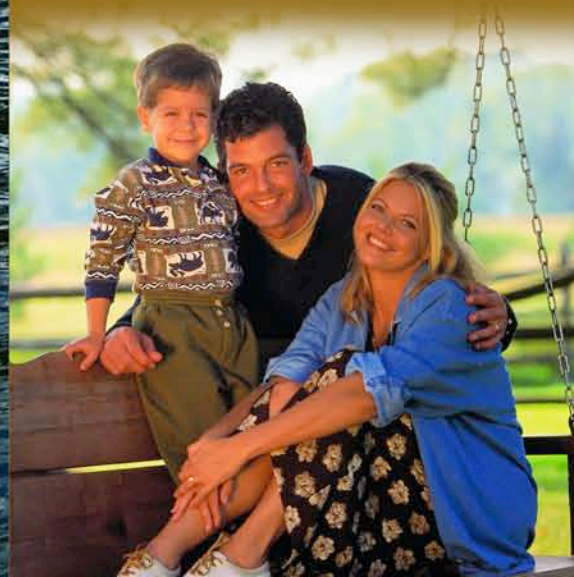


Protect yourself...

for Landowners

An abandoned well is one that is no longer in use.

All abandoned wells raise health, safety and environmental concerns. An abandoned well can serve as a route for contaminating groundwater.

Contaminated surface water, agricultural runoff and effluent from private sewage disposal systems can enter the groundwater through abandoned wells and cause pollution of other wells in the area used for drinking water.
