

Summary

All public and private landowners have a role to play in the conservation and restoration of the natural environment on the land they own.

The Hamilton Conservation Authority (HCA) is dedicated to the conservation of the natural environment throughout Dundas Valley area. Through the HCA's programs, it undertakes ecological monitoring, promotes biodiversity, regulates the watershed, conserves and acquires land, and is a leader within the community.

Actions

- Create naturalized and green corridors to maintain and enhance connectivity, including connecting HCA properties to Lake Ontario and Cootes Paradise (along Spencer Creek) to Webster's Falls
- Look at the City of Hamilton Trails Master Plan to see what linkages are shown
- HCA management to work with the Cootes to Escarpment Project Team to identify benefits of combining the Vision and Strategies
- Monitor biotic and abiotic parameters
- Assess the vulnerability of ecological corridors to climate change and develop action strategies
