The Dundas Valley area has unique, character filled roadways, streets, and coinciding scenery. The area's history, and heritage value is of outstanding significance to the community furthered through this strategic direction.

Summary

Special character roads are identified by their unique structural, topographic, and visual characteristics, as well as surrounding environment including built features, vegetation, cultural landscape, historical significance and their location within heritage areas.

The Dundas Valley area contains natural, cultural, and historical features such as the Sulphur Springs fountain seen from Sulphur Springs Road. Roads criss-cross at a number of junctions near trails that connect to a larger trail system.

Roads such as Old Dundas Road add value to the overall character of the Dundas Valley area, providing a local distinctiveness that should be protected and managed while at the same time facilitating opportunities to appreciate features that border each road.

Actions

- Identify criteria for 'special character road' designation
- Implement policies to protect from expansion/widening where feasible
- Prevent through traffic from utilizing special character roads
- Ensure safety of special character roads
- Ensure no new roads or highways through Environmentally Significant Areas or Areas of Natural or Scientific Interest
- Close in opened road allowances which go through Environmentally Significant Areas, Areas of Natural or Scientific Interest and Natural Heritage Lands.
- Obtain information from community on why they value the roads
- Reduce and restrict development on these roads
- Affix plaques detailing the nature of the 'special character' to foster awareness.

For the Dundas Valley 50-Year Vision and Strategy to be realized and its actions fulfilled, the community needs to take a leadership role. On the back page are a few links, of established resources and organizations currently working on, or with the potential to work on, the fulfilment of these actions, and the realization of the Dundas Valley 50-Year Vision and Strategy's strategic direction of recognizing and sustaining the special character roads through the Valley.
