4. DELEGATIONS

5. MEMBER BRIEFING

5.1 Shuttle Hub Operation

Gord Costie provided a tour and an update on the operation of the Shuttle Hub at Christie Lake. The Shuttle Hub opened on May 12 on weekends only. From May 12 to June 10 we have parked 2,000 cars and sold 6,890 wristbands. There is a gatehouse set up in the parking lot. The buses are running well. Staff are seeing a good upward trend in day use along with many favourable comments. Staff are gaining experience and confidence each week with the new operation in place.

At our Spencer Gorge Conservation Area, we now have locked the parking lots on the weekends. The Greensville Community is happy with the progress. The City ByLaw officers are still working on the weekends enforcing the no parking.

We do need to have more signage in place.

5.2 Conservation Authorities Act

Lisa Burnside provided a PowerPoint presentation and answered member's questions. Lisa indicated the following:

- CAs are watershed based, no matter where you are on the surface of the earth, you are in a watershed
- the Conservation Authorities Act was put in place in 1946 to ensure the conservation, restoration and responsible management of Ontario's natural resources through programs that balance human, environmental and economic needs

- the Act is enabling and focuses on:
 - the process to establish, operate and fund a conservation authority
 - the general scope of objectives for authority programs
 - the powers to achieve them
- in 2015, the Province through the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry initiated a review of the Conservation Authorities Act
- on December 12, 2017, Bill 139, the Building Better Communities and Conserving Watersheds Act, 2017, received Royal Assent
- key changes to the Act:
 - purpose statement
 - administrative bylaws
 - meetings open to the public
- changes to be phased in over time:
 - mandatory advisory committees
 - specific programs and services that CAs provide
 - fees for programs and services and fee guide
 - regulations update
 - compliance and enforcement tools

8.1 Tracking Report

Maria asked members if there were any questions on the Tracking Report.

9. STAFF REPORTS/MEMORANDUMS

9.1 Christie Pond 7

Colin Oaks provided a tour and a PowerPoint presentation on the Christie Lake Conservation Area Pond 7 restoration.

The project goals for the pond project are to:

- reduce water temperatures
- restore natural channel form/function
- restore fish passage and create spawning habitat
- rehabilitate riparian buffers
- improve species and habitat diversity

Work on Ponds 1 to 6 have been completed. The construction of Pond 7 was completed in the winter of 2018 which will follow with riparian plantings this fall.

Colin showed pictures of the pond rehab construction activities throughout the process.

Colin answered member's questions. Maria thanked Colin for the tour and the great presentation.

9.2 Fifty Point Conservation Area Pond – Fisheries Management

Mike Stone presented the report and answered member's questions.

One of the main environmental features in this conservation area is the pond that is located to the west of Fifty Creek. This pond was constructed in the late 1960's and is primarily supported by rain water and surface drainage, with possibly some groundwater input. The pond is periodically connected to Fifty Creek during elevated water levels. Fifty Creek drains to Lake Ontario. There is no outlet or drainage connection between the pond and the marina. The pond and watercourse are regulated as they are subject to floodplain and erosion hazards.

The pond has also traditionally been stocked with trout. Staff refer to this as a “put and take” fishery as the pond is stocked and the fish are taken by the angler with the fish not reproducing in the pond.

The HCA is required to obtain a license from the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNR) to stock the pond. MNR did a site visit in the spring and advised HCA that the pond did not meet conditions to stock due to the water levels of Fifty Creek and the resulting connection of the pond to Fifty Creek. Stocked ponds are required to be “off-line” to ensure stocked fish do not enter a natural waterbody.

HCA staff see an opportunity to create a natural fishery. Staff recommend to undertake the required investigation and design work to establish a self-sustaining fishery in the pond. This recommendation is consistent with HCA’s recent fisheries management philosophy and approach at conservation areas.

9.3 Changes in Public Pool Regulations 565 – Wild Waterworks

Sara Kinnear presented the memorandum and answered member's questions.

The Ministry of Health and Long Term Care undertook a revision of the Public Pool Regulations 565 during the last fifteen months. Recent changes to the regulations under the Health Protection and Promotion Act affecting public pools have been put into place. The changes in Legislation will affect every Class A pool in Ontario including water parks and municipality run pools. The particularly relevant aspect impacting Wild Waterworks is the legislation intended to promote the safety of young swimmers while participating in recreational swimming.

As an operator HCA must comply with the regulation which states the following:

“That every owner and every operator of a Class A pool shall ensure that there is a process in place to ensure a guardian or designated person supervises children 10 years of age and under. The process must include a swimming competency test and a method of communicating the requirements of the process O. Reg 494/17, s.13(10) 565.

A wave action pool presents unique and challenging logistics to undertake a swim competency test. Staff have worked with the City of Hamilton Public Health inspector to mutually agree upon the following measures in lieu of a swimming competency test. Wild Waterworks will be requiring anyone 10 years of age and under to wear an approved lifejacket/PFD in the Wave Action Pool and the Eazy River.

Wild Waterworks will have lifejackets/PFDs available on first come first serve basis free of charge for patron use.

Staff note that other water parks in the area are also moving to the use of lifejackets, in order to be in compliance.

9.4 Westfield Heritage Village Conservation Area Master Plan

Kathy Smith presented the memorandum and answered member's questions. The master plan was developed in a five stage process by staff who scoped the

work plan, developed a project schedule, and proposed a framework for consultation and review through an in-house steering committee.

The five stage process:

- Phase 1 – Initiation
 - scoping, engagement, visioning
- Phase 2 – Inventory
 - data gathering, mapping, surveys
- Phase 3 – Site Concept
 - synthesis, concept development
 - opportunities and constraints
- Phase 4 – Management and Operations
 - business plan and management plan
- Phase 5 – Finalize Master Plan
 - draft circulation
 - public review
 - stakeholder review

Staff are currently in Phase 5 – Finalizing the Master Plan and this is to be completed by August 2018 with reviews of the compiled draft plan by the steering committee, stakeholders, and Board of Directors and CAB members. The draft plan will be posted online for public review and comment from June 15 to July 24. Public comment will also be solicited at a public open house tentatively scheduled for the afternoon of Sunday, June 24 at Westfield.

The master plan process is at 80% completion, and Phase 5 will be completed when all comments are received. Staff look forward to receiving comments from all interested parties over the coming months, and presenting the final plan for adoption.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

THAT the Conservation Advisory Board recommends to the Board of Directors:

THAT, provided the wastewater to be discharged complies with all standards identified in Rothsay's Environmental Compliance Approval (ECA) for wastewater works issued by the Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks, the Hamilton Conservation Authority approve the proposal for October 1 Commencement of Rothsay's Annual Discharge Season on a One-Year Basis commencing October 1, 2018; and,

THAT upon the commencement of Rothsay's Early Annual Discharge Season, HCA will continue to monitor water quality; and,

THAT all regular testing of wastewater, along with testing for additional sewage indicators, continue by Rothsay over the One-Year Early Discharge Approval Period; and,

THAT HCA staff continue to work with Rothsay on monitoring the parameters of the wastewater discharge as it relates to the review of water quality in Christie Lake with costs covered by Rothsay as required; and further,

THAT Rothsay report on the results of the early commencement of the normal fall discharge period to the HCA and MOECP staff.

BACKGROUND

The Rothsay Dundas Plant is a meat rendering facility that renders raw meat material from meat processing plants, farms, grocery stores and restaurants and converts this into products including animal feeds, cosmetics, detergents and other products. As part of the rendering process and operation of the facility, wastewater is produced and treated on-site. The Environmental Compliance Approval (ECA) for Rothsay issued by the Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks allows for discharge of the treated wastewater. The discharge is released into a pond located on Rothsay property before being released into a wetland that flows into a watercourse on HCA lands (former Pond 4) and Christie Lake Conservation Area. The approved discharge period is November 1 to March 31. The discharge period is as detailed in the ECA and any variations to the dates specific must be approved by the HCA as per conditions as specified in the ECA.

A request for an early discharge was made in 2011 and was granted subject to the requirement for monitoring the wastewater at locations to be determined by staff on HCA lands. The monitoring work did not take place at that time. In September 2013, Rothsay requested an extension of their fall discharge period and a possible late extension so that wastewater can be discharged a month earlier and two weeks later in the spring. The request for an extension at that time was to facilitate the removal of an existing filter system and the installation of a replacement system. The Board of Directors approved the request for an early discharge period subject to the requested monitoring as detailed in 2011.

The early discharge did take place in 2013 and water quality monitoring based on an approved plan has been taking place downstream of the discharge point and at the expense of Rothsay. This monitoring program took place over a 4-year period and ceased in July 2018. The results in this monitoring report indicate that Rothsay's discharge may be having an impact on downstream water quality, although it is inconclusive if the observed increase in Total Phosphorous and Dissolved Organic Carbon during the discharge period were from Rothsay effluent and/or seasonal wetland patterns. Funds are still available within this program to continue with an Adaptive Monitoring Plan (AMP) in order to determine if the Rothsay effluent is the cause of increased concentrations observed downstream during the effluent discharge period or if this is a natural occurrence.

Rothsay has submitted a request for permanent October 1 commencement of Rothsay's annual discharge season. The estimated discharge season would be October 1 to December 31. The request is being made to facilitate efficiencies in the operation of the rendering and wastewater management facilities to avoid operation in cold weather and winter months.

STAFF COMMENT

As noted similar requests have been made to the HCA in the past and approved. The HCA has undertaken monitoring downstream of the discharge point over the past 4-years and this work has been undertaken at Rothsay's expense. The results from this monitoring program have been reviewed and reported on by an outside consultant and indicate that effluent from Rothsay may be having an impact downstream during the discharge period. Increased concentrations of Total Phosphorous (TP) and Dissolved Organic Carbon (DOC) during the discharge period may be due to effluent inputs from Rothsay or the result of seasonal patterns in the wetland. Wetlands are a common source of TP and DOC and seasonal trends are associated with plant growth and decay within the wetland. An AMP designed to determine the source of these inputs should commence during the 2018 discharge period in order to be able to responsibly conclude whether the effluent or the wetland itself (or both) is the source of these increased concentrations of TP and DOC. A report would be brought back to the HCA Board of Directors in 2019 with the results of the AMP with a recommendation regarding the future of early discharge approval from the HCA on a permanent or temporary basis.

CONCLUSIONS

HCA staff support the request for early discharge on a one-year basis, however monitoring is required to continue to determine the sources of increased TP and DOC

during the discharge period. This will allow for the AMP to take place and determine the source of elevated inputs during winter months (discharge period). Upon completion of the AMP, HCA staff will be able to make a recommendation in 2019 regarding allowing the early discharge on a permanent basis or maintaining the existing timing as per the ECA. The HCA and Rothsay have been working co-operatively on the monitoring of the discharge over the past 4-years to ensure the requirements of the HCA are addressed while meeting the requirements of Rothsay.
