6. CHAIRMAN'S REPORT OF BOARD OF DIRECTOR'S ACTIONS

The intent and gal is to ensure ongoing engagement and clear focus that supports good governance, help HCA achieve its strategic goals and complement the Board of Directors.

The draft terms of reference will be circulated by email to all CAB members for their review and comment.

Donna Kydd asked if this would be conflicting with the revised CA Act. Lisa indicated no details have been released on mandatory advisory committees at this time as noted in the revised Act and that HCA can be seen as being ahead of the legislation with CAB and terms will be reviewed again when details are known.

9. STAFF REPORTS/MEMORANDUMS

9.1 <u>Confederation Beach Park – Hamilton Marathon Road 2 Hope</u>

Bruce Harschnitz provided a PowerPoint presentation and indicated this is the largest two day event at Confederation Beach Park which takes place on Saturday, November 3 and Sunday, November 4.

This is a fundraiser event which supports over 25 local charities, raising over 2.5 million dollars in 10 years. The event is operated under a full user agreement with HCA/City of Hamilton for the use of the facilities for the weekend.

This is a race for all levels and all ages. On Saturday, there is a 1 km kid's loop race and a 5 km and 10 km race. On Sunday, there is a half and a full marathon that takes place.

Attendance for the weekend over the past three years has been approximately 4,000 with 1,500 registered for the full marathon.

9.2 <u>Proposal for Permanent October 1 Commencement of Rothsay's Annual</u> Discharge Season

Scott Peck presented the report. Scott introduced Greg Cooper and Abraham Mun from Rothsay. Scott indicated that Rothsay has submitted a request for permanent October 1 commencement of Rothsay's annual discharge season. The estimated discharge season would be October 1 to December 31. The request is being made to facilitate efficiencies in the operation of the rendering and wastewater management facilities to avoid operation in cold weather and winter months.

HCA staff support the request for early discharge on a one-year basis, however, monitoring is required to continue to determine the sources of increased TP and DOC during the discharge period.

HCA and Rothsay have been working co-operatively on the monitoring of the discharge over the past 4 years to ensure the requirements of the HCA are addressed while meeting the requirements of Rothsay.

Greg Cooper, Abraham Mun, and Scott answered member's questions.

9.3 Water Quality Monitoring Program

Chris Polap and Stacey Van Opstal presented a PowerPoint presentation and indicated the water quality monitoring program is fundamental to understanding watershed health. Chris answered member's questions.

Following is a summary of current monitoring programs:

Groundwater Monitoring:

- Provincial Groundwater Monitoring Network (PGMN)
 - started in 2000 to collect, analyze and report on high quality groundwater level and chemistry conditions
 - o support key water management programs
 - o recognize emerging issues, correlations and trends

- support adaptation planning associated with potential climate change effects
- share and communicate groundwater information with partners

Surface Water Monitoring:

- Provincial Water Quality Monitoring Network (PWQMN)
 - o measures water quality in rivers and streams across Ontario
 - over 400 locations monitored in partnership with CA's, Municipalities and Provincial Parks
 - o valuable database for tracking changes in water quality over time
 - o main objective is to protect human health and aquatic ecosystems

Hamilton Harbour Remedial Action Plan:

 this program helps to establish water quality targets for watercourses draining into Cootes Paradise

Maria thanked Chris and Stacey for their presentation.

9.4 Watershed Report Card

Sheila O'Neal provided a presentation on the watershed report card and answered member's questions. Watershed report cards are an important tool for Conservation Authorities, municipalities, and other partners to measure environmental change and target resources and program. They provide a better understanding of local environmental issues, focus actions where they are needed the most and track progress over time. The main challenges to healthy watershed continue to be the impacts of urbanization and climate change. Through their monitoring programs, Conservation Authorities will continue to track and report on conditions once every five years.

A press release went out July 6 to inform the public that the report card is available. This has been posted on our website and on social media.

BACKGROUND

Dundas was developed around Spencer Creek below the escarpment and has a history of flooding dating back to the 1800's. Many strategies have been employed over the years to reduce risk to property with varying levels of success. In addition, instability in the creek system still exists, which has led to erosion, which threatens infrastructure and property located near the creek.

Also, the Hamilton Harbour Remedial Action Plan, which has been working on the delisting of Hamilton Harbour as an Area of Concern since the 1990's, identified Spencer Creek as a major source of water to Cootes Paradise that requires further analysis to determine sources of pollutant loading and solutions for remediating water quality concerns.

In response to these issues and concerns as well as others, starting in 2012 the HCA undertook an Integrated Sub-Watershed Study for Lower Spencer Creek. The Conservation Advisory Board was advised of this project, and it was specifically noted that the purpose of this long-term planning study is to protect, maintain and enhance the ecological processes, functions and significant natural features of the area in the context of existing and changing watershed stressors. The study was completed such

that the requirements of an integrated sub-watershed study and of the Conservation Ontario and Municipal Class Environmental Assessment Processes are satisfied to facilitate implementation of the works. The study was managed by HCA staff, with some components undertaken by HCA staff and some components, which require outside expertise, undertaken by sub-consultants.

This science-based study investigated the functionality of the sub-watershed through assessment of the hydrology, hydraulics, hydrogeology, water quality, aquatic ecology, terrestrial ecology, and fluvial geomorphology. Integration between these disciplines was important to achieving a full understanding of the watershed and how it responds to change. All of the concerns and opportunities raised above were considered and incorporated both individually and as pieces of a larger strategy.

STAFF COMMENT

This memo has been brought before the Conservation Advisory Board for the purposes of providing an update as to the status of the study and to summarize some of the findings.

An overall report is presently being drafted which summarizes the hydrology, hydraulics, hydrogeology, water quality, aquatic ecology, terrestrial ecology, and fluvial geomorphology assessments on the characterization of existing conditions, the influence of potential future changes within the watershed to these conditions, suggested watershed targets and recommendations & enhancement opportunities.

For example, the study includes a comprehensive flood and erosion control assessment for Lower Spencer Creek and has identified flooding and erosion areas, as well as options for addressing identified problems. In addition, the study has also focused on better quantifying water quality and establishing achievable targets and recommendations for water quality improvements.

Recommendations and enhancement opportunities have been categorized by Planning & Policy, Rehabilitation & Retrofit, Stewardship, Monitoring, and Research & Development.

Examples of some of the recommendations include:

- Adopt updated Flood Plain Mapping through the Town of Dundas
- Undertake feasibility studies on increasing flow capacity in Lower Spencer Creek, enhancing outlet capacity from Cootes Paradise, providing additional upstream storage of storm runoff in order to reduce downstream flow rates
- Encourage storm water source control measures to diminish peak flow rates and total runoff volume in Lower Spencer Creek during localized storms, reducing erosion and water quality issues.

- Construct riffle-pool morphology to provide fish habitat enhancement, particularly spawning habitat for species migrating from Western Lake Ontario, Hamilton Harbour and Cootes Paradise
- Enhance riparian vegetation plantings
- Develop and implement an invasive vegetation species management plan
- Stewardship initiatives such as Low Impact Development, "no mow" areas, reduce road salting, street sweeping
- Protect groundwater infiltration and discharge areas in upper and lower watershed through source protection planning initiatives and maintaining groundwater balances
- Continue ongoing water quality monitoring in Spencer Creek under wet and dry weather conditions.

The draft overall report will be provided to HCA and City of Hamilton staff for review and comment.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

THAT the Conservation Advisory Board recommends to the Board of Directors:

THAT this report and accompanying master plan draft document of October 2018 be received as information for project background and general understanding; and further

THAT the Westfield Heritage Village Conservation Area Master Plan be approved.

BACKGROUND

Westfield Heritage Village opened to the public in 1964, and today is operated year round as a living history museum by the Hamilton Conservation Authority (HCA). Recent land acquisitions by HCA west of the heritage village have significantly increased the size of this conservation area to 202 hectares (500 acres).

The new Westfield Heritage Village Conservation Area Master Plan supports HCA's Vision and Mission Statements in the current Strategic Plan. The master plan reflects HCA's intent to protect the natural environment and constructed features of Westfield and to maintain and develop high quality facilities for cultural heritage appreciation, education, recreation, and enjoyment of the conservation area by visitors.

Work on this new master plan began February 2017 and was implemented by HCA staff through a five stage process. Throughout the process the plan was refined through ongoing staff consultation and periodic review through an in-house steering committee.

Phase 1 Initiation was completed by September 2017 with the establishment of the steering committee, engagement of staff, collection of mapping information, and gathering information through meetings and workshops. Staff, the steering committee, and selected volunteers and stakeholders were involved in this process.

Phase 2 Inventory was completed by February 2018 with collection and assembly of background information, mapping, and seasonal ecological field surveys of the property. Visitor surveys were conducted in the summer of 2017 in person and on-line with staff, volunteers, and the public. Staff also operated a public information booth at the Westfield Ice Cream Carnival to notify the public of the master plan process and respond to questions.

Phase 3 and 4 Site Concepts, Management and Operations was completed by April 2018 with a series of roundtable focus groups discussing site concept, site philosophy, vision and mission, operations, finance, marketing and tourism.

The final phase, Phase 5 Finalizing the Master Plan, is currently at 95% and will be completed upon endorsement by the Conservation Advisory Board, and adoption of the master plan by the HCA Board of Directors. This phase commenced June 2018 with preparation of the draft document for review and comment by the public, stakeholders, staff and the steering committee. A presentation was made to CAB on June 14th at Christie Lake CA to launch this phase of the process. Following this meeting the draft plan was refined and posted on the HCA website for public review and comment from July 12 to August 15th, an email was provided on the website for receipt of comments. Outside agencies, stakeholders, CAB, Board of Directors, staff, steering committee, and members of the public who provided us with their contact information during the master plan process were also directly circulated with the plan on July 11th and advised of the one month deadline for commenting. Copies of the master plan were distributed to Westfield staff to be available at Westfield for viewing. A public open house for the draft master plan was also advertised on HCA social media and held the afternoon of Sunday June 24th at Westfield in the Ironwood Building.

STAFF COMMENT

During the public commenting period July 12th to August 15th comments were received from HCA staff; Volunteers and Friends of Westfield; Grand River Conservation Authority; City of Hamilton Cultural Heritage Staff, Natural Heritage Planning Staff, Heritage Resource Management Staff; and the Public.

At the completion of the public commenting period, a total of sixty seven items were

received and brought forward to the HCA steering committee and staff for review and consideration. All comments received were reviewed with the HCA steering committee and executive team, and have been addressed in the revised draft accompanying this report.

Following is a brief overview of the key items brought forward that resulted in edits to the draft master plan.

HCA Staff

Staff comments helped refine statements on the village operation within the conservation area, vision, mission, goals and objectives. Conservation area operations, village operation, education programs, the need for supplementary operation and conservation management plans to be developed upon adoption of this master plan were also considered. A checklist was also suggested to help track implementation of items listed in the master plan, to be worked on by staff following approval of the master plan.

Volunteers and Friends of Westfield

Volunteers and Friends commented on the master plan sections mentioning the volunteers, operation of the heritage village, business case and revenue generation. They were generally supportive of the plan and interested in more detail on how it would be implemented. They were also pleased to see the importance we placed on volunteer efforts at Westfield and to strengthen statements on the importance of volunteers on service delivery at Westfield.

Grand River Conservation Authority

GRCA staff commented that from a natural heritage perspective, the goals and proposed works outlined within the master plan are generally supportable and consistent with GRCA policy. Expansion of the trail network to cross regulated wetlands and watercourses will require a GRCA permit. Trails should avoid hydrological and ecological impacts to natural heritage features.

City of Hamilton Staff

City staff submitted over thirty comments to help strengthen the master plan sections on planning, cultural heritage, heritage designation at Westfield, conservation area development, funding sources, collections management, and mapping. They also strongly encouraged including support for indigenous engagement and archaeological assessment of the property in the master plan.

Another significant item city staff brought to our attention is that no new development or site alterations are permitted within or adjacent to the environmentally sensitive areas at Westfield, unless it can be demonstrated through an Environmental Impact Statement

(EIS) that there will be no negative impacts on the ecological features. An EIS may be required to be completed for some of the proposed new trails, as well as any new buildings or structures west of the heritage village (west of the P4 zone boundary shown on the mapping).

<u>Public</u>

We received five comments during the public commenting period, and one comment submitted at a later date, from people familiar with Westfield. Their comments concerned the following topics:

- A person with a background in heritage restoration requested more information in the master plan on the heritage structures on site.
- An HCA pass holder expressed support for public access seven days a week, as well as more recreational trails on the property.
- A person with a spouse in a wheelchair provided comments on accessibility and ideas for revenue generation.
- A person with an interest in electric vehicles requested an electric charging station in the parking lot.
- A person with a tree growing business provided comments on the conservation area management, managed forests, wildlife habitat features, and restoration.
- A person with knowledge of the school programs submitted a late comment expressing HCA address indigenous engagement in the master plan and the education programs at Westfield.
