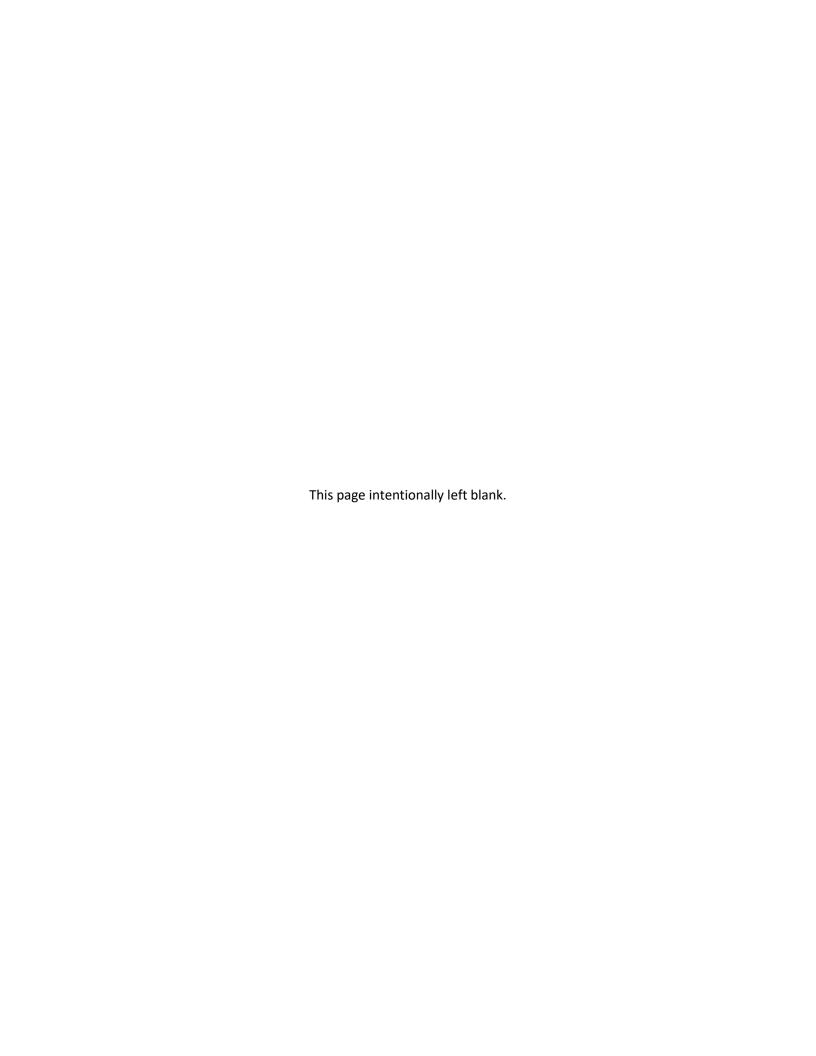

1. Call to Order

6. Foundation Briefing

Graham Reid reported on the following:

The Foundation received a total of **\$17,166** in new donations from September 1st to September 30th 2023. They break down as follows:

\$4,497 to the Trail Development Fund

- \$3,794 to our Area of Greatest Need Fund
- \$3,500 to the Memorial Bench program
- \$2,020 to our "Step into Nature" Environmental Education Fund

The remaining **\$3,355** was directed to various projects, including Tribute Trees, Fifty Point and Saltfleet Conservation Areas.

This brings the fiscal year-to-date fundraising total to \$773,439, which is 93% of their goal.

9. Reports from Budget & Administration Committee and Conservation Advisory Board

9.1. Budget & Administration Committee – September 23, 2023

9.1.1. BA 2321 <u>Draft 2024 Operating & Capital Budgets</u>

Scott Fleming presented a detailed overview of the budgets and answered the members' questions.

There was discussion regarding detailed budget items for water quality monitoring, stewardship and land securement. Lisa Burnside noted that land securement is category 3 activity and must be self funded or HCA would need to secure an agreement with the City of Hamilton to fund this activity using municipal monies. In the past, HCA has allocated surplus funds and sought grants for land acquisitions. Staff were directed to bring forward a breakdown of the budget items for water quality monitoring and stewardship to the next Board meeting.

There was discussion regarding the potential for program level budgets to be brought forward to the Board. It was noted that the proposed budget is primarily a maintenance budget, but that future funding will need to be allocated for new initiatives identified through the new strategic plan and a program budget level will be considered for 2025.

Historical and current provincial funding to HCA was discussed. Historically, the province contributed 50% funding to Conservation Authorities. A decrease in funding has occurred since that time. Currently, the province contributes less than 2% of HCA's total budget. Provincial section 39 funds are limited to flood forecasting and warning, dam operations and regulations and planning program related to natural hazards. It was noted that in some years, the funding provided constitutes 50% of costs, however at other times, HCA's contribution is significantly higher, depending on projects and initiatives undertaken. HCA has received other funds from the province in recent years, such as through the Water and Erosion Control Infrastructure (WECI) program.

In accordance with O. Reg. 402/22, s. 17, under Conservation Authorities Act, the draft budgets will be circulated to HCA's participating municipalities, the City of Hamilton and Township of Puslinch for their review and will be returned as a formality to the December board meeting for final approval.

Dear Premier Ford and Minister Smith,

On September 27th, Hamilton City Council endorsed the Hamilton Conservation Authority resolution to reverse the changes to the Conservation Authorities Act and Ontario Wetland Evaluation System, as follows:

WHEREAS over the past several years the Provincial Government has amended the Conservation Authorities Act to reduce the effectiveness of Conservation Authorities in protecting natural heritage (i.e., Bill 23), and;

WHEREAS, the Provincially Significant Wetland Evaluation System has also been changed leading Conservation Ontario to estimate that over 80% of the wetlands that currently receive protection will lose this status, and;

WHEREAS, legislative changes implemented January 1, 2023 to Conservation Authority roles related to Natural Heritage and review under prescribed Acts as well changes to the Ontario Wetland

Evaluation System, as well as remaining legislative changes regarding Conservation authority development regulations that have not yet come into effect, if implemented, would have serious unintended consequences, and;

WHEREAS recent reports by the Provincial Auditor-General and the Integrity Commissioner have raised serious concerns on the bias and lack of transparency and fairness in the Greenbelt removals, drawing conclusions that the changes unfairly benefitted private landowners, and;

WHEREAS, the role of Conservation Authorities in protecting natural heritage and mitigating/ adapting for climate change has never been more important in light of the 6th Mass Extinction in biodiversity and the increasing possibility that Canada and the world will not meet the Paris Accord greenhouse gas target limiting temperature rise to less than 1.5 degrees Celsius, and;

WHEREAS the Hamilton Conservation Authority's ability to provide comments on natural heritage to the City of Hamilton is critical and must be restored.

Therefore, be it resolved:

That the Hamilton Conservation Authority Board of Directors respectfully request that:

- a) the Province of Ontario reverse recent changes to the Conservation Authorities Act and Provincially Significant Wetland Evaluation System that adversely affect natural heritage protection, and;
- the Province of Ontario's Auditor General undertake an investigation into the processes that were followed to make the above policy decisions, and whether this decisionmaking structure and its outcomes provide Ontarians with value for money, and;
- That the Hamilton Conservation Authority Board requests that City of Hamilton Council provide similar direction to the Province of Ontario and;
- d) That a copy of this Hamilton Conservation Authority Board of Director's motion be shared with local Members of Provincial Parliament, Conservation Ontario and all conservation

authorities in Ontario.

Hamilton City Council also directed staff to send a letter to the Auditor General to request an investigation on the activates surrounding this matter.

Thank you for your letter dated September 18, in which you shared the Hamilton Conservation Authority's recent resolution, requesting my Office to investigate the processes and recent changes related to the Provincially Significant Wetland Evaluation System and the role of conservation authorities.

We take inquiries from the public seriously. We will consider the issues the Hamilton Conservation Authority has raised when considering future audit topics.

I would also like to draw your attention to our recent audit of *Climate Change Adaptation: Reducing Urban Flood Risk* (2022 value-for-money audit) in which we reviewed, in part, the Ontario Wetland Evaluation System, and made a number of recommendations to improve urban flood resiliency in the province. As part of our normal processes, we will conduct a follow-up audit in 2024 to determine the status of implementation of the report's recommendations. The results will be included in our 2024 Annual Report.

STAFF COMMENT

This memo is follow-up from the October 2, 2023 Board Meeting where staff were asked to bring forward a breakdown of budget items for Stewardship and Water Quality Monitoring.

<u>Stewardship:</u> Stewardship activities are completed within the Inventory of Programs & Services as follows:

Drinking Water Source Protection:

DW2 - Stewardship

- Well decommissioning.

Core Watershed-based Resource Management Strategy:

CW4 - Watershed Stewardship and Restoration (Urban, Rural & Agriculture)

 Apply for and manage external funding, promote private land stewardship, outreach, provide advice and design assistance to property owners.
 Implementation of watershed plan stewardship recommendations.

Conservation Lands and Conservation Areas:

CL4 - Management, operation and Maintenance of CA owned lands

- Management and Maintenance of HCA owned lands (which includes Stewardship).

The 2024 budgeted expenditures for these three items total \$232,808.

<u>Water Quality:</u> Water Quality activities are completed within the Inventory of Programs & Services as follows:

Water Quality & Quantity Monitoring:

- WQ1 Provincial Water Quality Monitoring Network (PWQMN)
 - A long-standing (50+ year) CA/MECP partnership for stream water quality monitoring. CA takes water samples; MECP does lab analysis and data management.
- WQ2 Provincial Groundwater Monitoring Network (PGMN)
 - A long-standing (20+ year) CA/MECP partnership for groundwater level and quality monitoring. CA maintains equipment, data transfer to MECP, water sampling; MECP provides equipment, standards, data management.
- WQ3 Aquatic Monitoring Program non-HCA lands
 - Aquatic monitoring on a 3-year cycle basis (OBBN, temperature and fish collection).
- WQ4 Water Quality Monitoring City
 - Water quality and erosion site monitoring for City of Hamilton
 - City of Hamilton Groundwater Monitoring Well Inspections
 - City of Hamilton Groundwater Monitoring Well Water Quality Sampling
 - City of Hamilton E. Coli Sampling Program at PWQMN Sites
 - Greensville Surface Water Monitoring
- WQ5 Water Quality Monitoring COA and HHRAP
 - Water quality monitoring associated with tributaries to Cootes Paradise as part of COA and HHRAP monitoring.

The 2024 budgeted expenditures for these five items total \$457,069.

ArcelorMittal Dofasco Natural Gas Pipeline

BACKGROUND & PURPOSE

At the September 7th HCA Board of Directors meeting staff received questions regarding Agenda Item 5.1, Summary Application Report – Development, Interference with Wetlands and Alterations to Shoreline and Watercourses Regulation 161/06. Staff were asked to clarify:

- 1. If the applications made by oil and gas companies included in the summary report were for the maintenance of existing pipelines; and
- If staff had been engaged in discussion regarding the pipeline proposed by Enbridge Gas Inc. (Enbridge) to increase the supply of natural gas to ArcelorMittal Dofasco (AMD).

Staff advised the applications made by oil and gas companies included in the summary report were for integrity digs required for the maintenance of existing pipelines, and that HCA staff had been circulated with the considered routes for the proposed AMD pipeline and had provided comments related to aquatic ecology, terrestrial ecology, and water resource engineering.

A motion was passed by the Board of Directors that staff prepare an information memo for the Board of Directors regarding the pipeline proposed by Enbridge to service AMD.

STAFF COMMENT

<u>Summary of Proposed Enbridge Gas Inc. & ArcelorMittal Dofasco Natural Gas Pipeline</u>

AMD is proposing to phase out coal-fired ironmaking operations and requires Enbridge provide an increased natural gas supply as part of this multi-year plan. Enbridge has proposed to construct a new natural gas pipeline to increase the capacity of its network in the City of Hamilton and meet the increased natural gas demand proposed by AMD.

Enbridge has identified a preliminary preferred route (PPR) and three alternative routes for the proposed natural gas pipeline which would tie into Enbridge's existing natural gas infrastructure in the area. The PPR and alternative routes are attached to this report. Following the identification of the PPR and alternative routes, Enbridge retained Dillon Consulting Limited (Dillon) to conduct an environmental and cumulative effects assessment (Environmental Report) in conformance with the Ontario Energy Board (2016) *Environmental Guidelines for the Location, Construction and Operation of Hydrocarbon Pipelines and Facilities in Ontario, 7th Edition.* Based on the technical analysis and findings of the draft Environmental Report the preferred route was identified. The draft Environmental Report shared with HCA staff has not been released publicly and is currently being reviewed and finalized by Dillon and Enbridge. At this time HCA staff are not able to publicly share details of the information within or findings of the Environmental Report. HCA has requested Enbridge provide HCA with the final Environmental Report once it is available.

Review of Regulatory Process of Natural Gas Pipelines in Ontario

Energy utilities proposing new facilities, such as new natural gas pipelines, must apply to and receive approval from the Ontario Energy Board (OEB) as per the *Ontario Energy Board Act*, 1998. Energy utilities must file a Leave to Construct application with the OEB who reviews the application to determine whether the proposed project is in the public interest. When evaluating proposals, the OEB considers:

- Economic feasibility
- Safety obligations
- Environmental impacts and proposed mitigation measures
- Appropriateness of agreements with affected landowners
- Duty to consult with Indigenous peoples

The OEB has established a standard issues list considered for applications to construct hydrocarbon pipelines which is available on their <u>website</u>.

Prior to submission of a Leave to Construct application to the OEB, the Ontario Pipelines Coordinating Committee (OPCC) coordinates a review of proposed natural gas projects in Ontario by various Ontario government ministries. OPCC reviews environmental assessments and reports prepared by energy companies and raises any

concerns with the applicant(s) before a Leave to Construct application is submitted to the OEB.

Once a Leave to Construct application is submitted to the OEB, the general process is as follows:

- Notice of application is issued
- Review application, questions/concerns expressed in submitted comments, and requests for intervenor status
- Project specific issues list is determined
- Oral, electronic, or written public hearing held (for most major applications)
- Review and consider input from individuals or groups that have OEB permission to actively participate in a public hearing (referred to as intervenors)
- Review input from OEB staff
- Review response from applicant(s)
- Decision and order issued

Based on HCA staff's understanding, Enbridge anticipates submitting a Leave to Construct application for this project in late 2023.

In addition to OEB approval, other regulatory approvals may be required for the proposed pipeline project including those issued under the *Endangered Species Act*, *Ontario Water Resources Act*, *Ontario Heritage Act*, *Conservation Authorities Act*, *Niagara Escarpment Development Act*, *Railway Safety Act*, and local by-laws. Other regulatory approvals would be required prior to construction and confirmed during final project design.

HCA Staff Review & Comments to Date

On February 6th, 2023 HCA staff were provided with a Notice of Study Commencement and Public Information Sessions for the proposed Enbridge & AMD natural gas pipeline project by Dillon on behalf of Enbridge. This notice also included a request for information relating to environmentally sensitive areas, floodplains, and natural features within or in the vicinity of the considered pipeline routes outlined in the notice. HCA staff reviewed the information and advised that portions of each considered route are affected by *Ontario Regulation 161/06* (HCA's Regulation of Development, Interference with Wetlands and Alterations to Shorelines and Watercourses) made under the *Conservation Authorities Act, R.S.O. 1990* and written permission from HCA for proposed development or site alteration within these regulated areas would be required. Staff also advised of HCA data available for the study area as requested by Dillon. HCA staff requested to be placed on the project contact list.

On May 31st, 2023 HCA staff were circulated the draft Environmental Report completed by Dillon for the Enbridge & AMD natural gas pipeline project and advised the report had been submitted to the OPCC for review. HCA staff reviewed the report and provided comments related to aquatic ecology, terrestrial ecology, and water resource engineering.

The preferred route identified in the Environmental Report is regarded by staff as the least environmentally disruptive of the considered routes. A brief summary of the comments provided by HCA staff are outlined in the table below. All comments were technical in nature and related to HCA's regulatory role under the *Conservation Authorities Act*.

As noted above the proposed pipeline will require written permission from HCA pursuant to *Ontario Regulation 161/06* (HCA's Regulation of Development, Interference with Wetlands and Alterations to Shorelines and Watercourses) made under the *Conservation Authorities Act*. It is expected that additional information will be provided to HCA related to technical requirements summarized above (i.e. construction methods, erosion and sediment control, etc.) as the project progresses through detailed design to the permitting stage. The project is currently at a preliminary stage and detailed analysis and data which may be required as part of HCA's permitting process is not yet available.

The preferred route of the proposed pipeline identified in the draft Environmental Report is not located within any lands owned by HCA and there is no anticipated direct impact to HCA owned lands by the construction of the proposed pipeline.



CONCLUSIONS

Enbridge has proposed a new natural gas pipeline to increase the capacity of its network in the City of Hamilton and meet the increased natural gas demand of ArcelorMittal Dofasco. The proposed pipeline requires the approval of the Ontario Energy Board, and is being considered under its regulations and guidelines. As part of this process, HCA has been provided the opportunity to review and comment. HCA has no significant natural heritage or natural hazard concerns with the project based on the information provided to date, but have noted that portions of the proposed pipeline will require approval by HCA under its regulation, and that as part of the permitting process additional technical details will be required related to construction methods for watercourse crossings.


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






















Alternative Route 2 — Major Roads

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

Reporting

BACKGROUND & PURPOSE

The Watershed Conditions Report was presented at the October 5, 2023 Board of Directors meeting. From this presentation, additional reporting on water quality and stewardship activities was requested. Staff noted that they will review the request and report back to the Board at a future meeting to determine parameters and a schedule for such reporting to be effective. Staff have completed this review and have concluded that the most effective reporting timing for aquatic, terrestrial, water quality and stewardship activities is on an annual basis.

STAFF COMMENTS

The monitoring program that provides data (rain gauge, stream flow gauge, weather monitoring, soil and snow conditions and reservoir data) that is used to complete the Watershed Conditions report is data that reflects currents conditions in the watershed related to flooding and erosion and the HCA's mandated role to monitor and advise our municipal partners and the public regarding these current conditions for the protection of life and property. The effective reporting timing for these weather-related flooding and erosion issues is monthly.

In addition to this natural hazard monitoring work, the HCA also undertakes aquatic, terrestrial and water quality monitoring programing. It is important to note that this monitoring work is not a spills response or wildlife management program. This monitoring work allows HCA staff to gauge long term trends, overall watershed health

and identify restoration opportunities. The HCA's Stewardship program also utilizes this information to assist in identifying priority landowner contact and associated private land restoration opportunities. This monitoring data, specifically the water quality data, is shared with the City of Hamilton and is reported on annually to our partners through the Hamilton Harbour Remedial Action Plan. The overall data is also used to inform the HCA's Watershed Report Card which is completed every 5 years. In this regard, the effective reporting timing for this environmental monitoring is annually. As such, staff will prepare an annual report for the Board and will present this report annually at the December Board of Directors meetings commencing in 2024.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

THAT HCA staff recommends to the Board of Directors:

That the Board of Directors endorse the five (5) climate change priorities and budget allocations identified in this report; and

That the Board of Directors approve the use of \$75,000 from the Climate Change Reserve account for the construction of the EV charging stations.

BACKGROUND & PURPOSE

At the February, 2023 Board of Directors meeting, the HCA's "Toward a Net-Zero Future: Hamilton Conservation Authority's Corporate Climate Change Strategy" was approved. HCA's Corporate Climate Change Strategy outlines how our organization can adapt to climate change while reducing our overall impact through the reduction of greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions. The focus of this strategy is HCA's: Operations, environment and natural heritage, experience, education and awareness, and partnerships.

Staff were directed to develop work priorities, identify funding streams and budget allocations for the remainder of 2023 and beginning of 2024 and report back to the Board.

Based on this direction from the Board of Directors, the purpose of this report is to outline the results of an energy audit that has been conducted at the HCA main office "Woodend" and recommend, priority items for HCA's climate action for the rest of 2023 and 2024 that have been identified by staff.

STAFF COMMENT

Since approval of HCA's Corporate Climate Change Strategy, an ASHRAE Level II energy audit was conducted at the Woodend Office. Suggested energy efficiency measures (EEMs) in the report are separated into two (2) categories, being:

- 1. Low and no cost measures (<\$5,000); and
- 2. Operational and capital measures (>\$5,000).

Proposed EEMs are as follows:

- 1. Low and no cost measures:
 - a) Creating and implementing a staff Energy Awareness Program;
 - b) Creating and implementing a Monitoring and Targeting Program;
 - c) Installation of occupancy/vacancy sensors for offices;
 - d) Weather stripping: addressing airflow in the capped fireplace chimney;
 - e) Improve efficiency of the fuel oil furnace through the installation of an outdoor air damper; and
 - f) Added insulation to domestic hot water tank pipes.
- 2. Operational and capital measures:
 - a) Replace the fuel oil furnace with a cold climate heat pump solution;
 - b) Upgrade single pane windows to double pane; and
 - c) Replace lights with LED lighting.

Climate change priorities for the remainder of 2023 and 2024:

- 1) The HCA has been approved for the Electric Vehicle (EV) Charger Incentive Program through Green Economy Canada. This funding requires that the proposed EV charging stations are installed by the end of 2023, making this project a main priority. To meet the requirements of the Green Economy Canada funding, one Nissan ARIYA EV has been purchased for use at the Woodend Office. This vehicle is replacing an internal combustion engine vehicle within HCA's fleet.
- Development of Fleet Decarbonization Guidelines that indicates goals for when HCA's vehicle and equipment fleets will be decarbonized, which will be brought to the Board of Directors for approval once completed.

- 3) Conduct at least one (1) additional energy audit for an HCA building in 2024. Following the Woodend Office, the next two priority buildings have been identified as:
 - a. Dundas Valley Workshop; and
 - b. Dundas Valley Trail Centre
- 4) Undergo select retrofits in the Woodend Office that have been recommended through the energy audit, as stated above. Retrofits will be selected based on available time and resources in 2024. While it is our intent to implement the operational and capital EEMs, they may be deferred to a later date. If all EEMs are implemented at Woodend, it would result in an estimated reduction of 29.1 tonnes of GHG emissions annually.
- 5) While HCA's current work priorities are focused on our organization's operations, other priorities that were listed in the February Board of Directors Report are still on-going by staff, which include:
 - a. Continued work on programs such as watershed monitoring (water quality, aquatic and terrestrial);
 - b. Invasive species management and strategy; and
 - c. Continuing to fully understand HCA's GHG emissions and opportunities to reduce.

STRATEGIC PLAN LINKAGE

HCA's Strategic Plan 2019-2024 outlines major strategic priority areas and related initiatives for advancing HCA's Vision to provide a healthy watershed for everyone. HCA implements a wide variety of programs over these Strategic Priority Areas and the HCA Corporate Climate Change Strategy is considered as an integral part of our programming and operations.

LEGAL/FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The HCA has been approved for the EV Charger Incentive Program through Green Economy Canada. This program reimburses up to 50% of associated expenditures related to installing the pre-approved EV charging stations, with a maximum of \$5,000 per connector. HCA will cover the initial capital costs and once all documentation is submitted, Green Economy Canada will reimburse the HCA for all eligible costs. HCA staff are requesting to withdrawal \$75,000 from the Climate Change Reserve in order to cover the upfront costs of the associated construction, procurement, and installation of the two (2) EV charging station at the Woodend Office.

All leftover funds as well as reimbursements from Green Economy Canada will be returned to the Climate Change Reserve following completion of the EV Charging Station Project.

The funding used for the purchase of the Nissan ARIYA EV was accounted for in HCA's vehicle fleet budget. A federal government incentive of \$5,000 was applied at the time of purchase.

All retrofits undertaken at Woodend will be funded from the Climate Change budget reserve accounts for 2024. The 2024 budget indicates that 10% of HCA annual pass sales will be added to the Climate Change Reserve, which will be used towards climate change initiatives across the HCA that have been outlined in this report. The nine (9) EEM's identified through the energy audit conducted at Woodend has an estimated total of \$58,200 (see Appendix A) with final costs to be confirmed once quotes are received. Funds for completing the identified retrofits will be withdrawn as necessary. HCA can apply for funding opportunities that are available through the Save on Energy Program, which is a partner of Enbridge Gas. This program provides incentives for projects that result in the reduction of energy use and carbon emissions, including but not limited to:

- Lighting retrofits;
- Lighting controls;
- HVAC redesign; and
- Custom equipment retrofits.

The cost of conducting at least one additional energy audit for an HCA building in 2024 is estimated at approximately \$8,500 and will also be funded from the Climate Change Reserve account.

CONCLUSIONS

HCA's priority for the remainder of 2023 is to install two (2) EV charging stations at the Woodend Office in order to meet the requirements of the EV Charger Incentive Program through Green Economy Canada. This project will help reduce HCA's fleet emissions, while also acting as a pilot project for HCA's fleet decarbonization across all other Conservation Areas. Climate change priorities going into 2024 include implementing as many of the EEMs identified in the energy conducted at HCA's main office as time and resources allow, the development of a Fleet & Equipment Decarbonization Guideline, and have at least one (1) additional energy audit conducted on an HCA building. All of the identified priorities outlined in this report will be funded through the Climate Change Reserve.

RE: Watershed Conditions Report

SYNOPSIS

During the period of September 25th 2023 to October 24th 2023, there were no observations, reports, or expectations of significant water safety concerns, significant watercourse flooding events, or Lake Ontario shoreline flooding events. That said, there was 1 potential Lake Ontario shoreline flooding event that warranted issuing messages and additional monitoring of conditions.

Currently, there are also no observations, reports, or expectations that significant watercourse flooding or significant water safety concerns are occurring. Current flows are at baseflow conditions to slightly elevated above baseflow conditions at all streamflow gauges

Currently, there are no observations, reports, or expectations that significant Lake Ontario shoreline flooding is occurring.

The average monthly flows for October so far have predominantly been well below to significantly below long-term averages. The exception was Ancaster Creek at Wilson Street, where monthly flow has been slightly below average. This is due to the fact that the Ancaster area received higher amounts of rain over the month so far, compared to the other gauges.

The Lake Ontario mean daily water level averaged across the entire lake is currently about 2 cm below average for this time of year.

Current Christie Lake levels are slightly below the preferred summer operating levels. As of yesterday, outflows at the Christie Lake dam were raised, to increase flows in Lower Spencer Creek in support of the recently started salmon spawning season. Current Valens Lake levels are within the preferred summer operating levels.

The most recent drought assessment indicated that normal conditions are an appropriate overall characterization of the watershed. Although monthly precipitation amounts in September were very low, the monthly amounts in July and August had been significantly above normal.

There are no significant rainfall events (+20 mm in a day) forecasted for the watershed over the next 2 weeks, at this time. In the next 9 days, no significant Lake Ontario shoreline flooding is expected, at this time. HCA staff will continue to undertake monthly drought assessments, and coordinate with the Hamilton Low Water Response Team as required if drought conditions are identified.

CURRENT WATERSHED CONDITIONS – October 24th, 2023

Current Flows in Major Area Watercourses

There are no observations, reports, or expectations that significant watercourse flooding or significant water safety concerns are occurring at this time. Current flows are at baseflow conditions to slightly elevated above baseflow conditions at all streamflow gauges [Upper Spencer Creek at Safari Road, Middle Spencer Creek at Highway 5, Lower Spencer Creek at Market Street, Ancaster Creek at Wilson Street and Red Hill Creek at Barton Street].

The average monthly flows for October so far have predominantly been well below to significantly below long-term averages. Monthly flow in Upper Spencer Creek at Safari Road has been 43% of long-term averages (considered well below average). Monthly flow Middle Spencer Creek at Highway 5 has been 55% of long-term averages (considered well below average). Monthly flow in Lower Spencer Creek at Market Street has been 36% of long-term averages (considered significantly below average). Monthly flow in Red Hill Creek at Barton Street has been 56% (considered below average). The exception was Ancaster Creek at Wilson Street, where monthly flow has been 75% (considered slightly below average). This is due to the fact that the Ancaster area received higher amounts of rain (15 to 50% more) over the month so far, compared to the other gauges.

September 2023 average flows varied considerably with respect to long-term averages. Monthly flows at the three Spencer Creek gauges were 134% to 152% (considered above average). Monthly flow in Ancaster Creek at Wilson Street was 91% (considered near average). That said, monthly flow in Red Hill Creek at Barton Street was 49% (considered well below average). Flows were significantly elevated in August at all gauges. However, flows decreased into September at a slower rate in Spencer Creek compared to in Redhill Creek and to a lesser extent Ancaster Creek. Flows in Redhill

Creek and Ancaster Creek have been noted to typically increase and decrease more quickly, due to the more urban nature of their catchments.

August 2023 average flows were significantly above long-term averages at most gauges (ranging from 247% to 640%). That said, monthly flow in Ancaster Creek at Wilson Street was 157% (considered well above average).

Current Lake Ontario Water Levels

At this time, there are no observations, reports, or expectations of significant Lake Ontario shoreline flooding. The Lake Ontario mean daily water level in the Hamilton area was 74.62 m IGLD85 as of yesterday. The Lake Ontario mean daily water level averaged across the entire lake (74.60 m IGLD85 as of yesterday) is about 2 cm below average for this time of year.

Current Storages in HCA Reservoirs

Current Christie Lake levels (770.90 ft) are slightly below the preferred summer operating levels (771.0 to 771.5 ft). As of yesterday, outflows at the Christie Lake dam were raised, to increase flows in Lower Spencer Creek in support of the recently started salmon spawning season.

Current Valens Lake levels (275.36 m) are within the preferred summer operating levels (275.25 to 275.45m).

Current Soil Conditions

Soil moisture data has not recently been available, but surface and root-zone soils are expected to be considered dry to moist.

RECENT STORM EVENTS

During the period of September 25th 2023 to October 24th 2023, there were no observations, reports, or expectations of significant water safety concerns, significant watercourse flooding events, or Lake Ontario shoreline flooding events.

That said, there was 1 potential Lake Ontario shoreline flooding event that warranted issuing messages and additional monitoring of conditions.

Potential For Lake Ontario Shoreline Flooding

October 10th to 13th

Forecasts for October 14 and 15 expected sustained shore-bound winds of up to 38 km/hr, with wind gusts of up to 66 km/hr. Wave heights of up to 2.1 m were forecasted.

An early notice was issued of the potential for shoreline flooding and erosion, due to the forecasted storm surge and wave action. However, forecasted wave heights decreased significantly in the following days.

HCA engineering staff issued the following message to communicate the potential Lake Ontario Shoreline flooding risks to the City and public:

- Watershed Conditions Statement (Flood Outlook) Lake Ontario Storm Surge on October 10th
- Termination of Watershed Conditions Statement (Flood Outlook) Lake Ontario Storm Surge on October 13th

RECENT WATERSHED LOW WATER CONDITIONS

The most recent drought assessment (including data up to September 30) indicated that normal conditions are an appropriate overall characterization of the watershed. This was the ninth consecutive recent monthly assessment that indicated normal conditions. Although monthly precipitation amounts in September were very low, the monthly amounts in July and August had been significantly above normal.

FORECASTED WATERSHED CONDITIONS

Watercourse Flooding

There are currently no significant rainfall events (+20 mm in a day) forecasted for the watershed over the next 2 weeks. HCA staff continue to monitor conditions and forecasts routinely. Resultant water levels and flows from currently anticipated rain are not expected to result in significant watercourse flooding.

Lake Ontario Shoreline Flooding

In the next 9 days, no significant Lake Ontario shoreline flooding is expected. According to International Lake Ontario – St. Lawrence River Board information, weather conditions, including temperatures and precipitation, will primarily determine the rate and magnitude of water level fluctuations over the coming weeks.

Watershed Low Water Conditions

HCA staff will continue to undertake monthly drought assessments, and coordinate with the Hamilton Low Water Response Team as required if drought conditions are identified.

RE: Conservation Areas Experiences Update

BACKGROUND:

HCA provides high quality, diverse conservation areas that promote outdoor recreation, health and well being and strengthen public awareness of the importance of being in or near our conservation areas.

STAFF REPORTING COMMENTS

- Spencer Gorge Conservation Area the reservation service is ending in mid November for 2023 operations. Advance reservations have proved to be an effective visitor management tool keeping vehicle congestion and pedestrian hazards to a minimum. Additional security measures were added post the Thanksgiving long weekend to address the late colour season and related sure of visitation amidst fair weather conditions. Staff are still actively collecting data and analyzing metrics from the operations reporting to the Conservation Advisory Board in 2024 with the findings.
- Haudenosaunee Habitat Wildlife Authority Deer Harvest commences on Monday November 6 to Thursday December 7 in the west end of the Dundas Valley Conservation Area. This is an archery only deer hunt for Indigenous harvesters with the support of the Ministry Natural Resources Forestry, Hamilton Police Service, and Municipal Bylaw Enforcement. The deer harvest is a long standing tradition respected for providing sustenance for the Haudenosaunee community with a Board approved Specific Agreement through 2024.

- Westfield Heritage Village Conservation Area Westfield is unveiling the new trail system November 4, 2023. This 503-acre conservation area now boosts 6.7 kilometers along with the historical village consisting of over 30 historic buildings. A friendly and easy-going trail system for the whole family to enjoy with newly packed gravel surfaces and features three new bridges to explore.
- <u>Fifty Point Conservation Area</u> A sure sign of changing seasons is the fall boat lift for the season. Staff have safely and carefully removed and stored over 200 boats and 70 masts with the 40-ton marine boat lift for winter storage. A dedicating team from Fifty Point and Conservation Areas across the watershed come to participate this biannual work project each spring and fall.
